JAMES WILSON

James Wilson was one of the 9 signatories to the Declaration of Independence who could claim to be Scottish. His claims to fame rest on solid foundation and he is rightly honoured not only in the United States but throughout the world for his work in help -ing to create and develop that nation.

However it is his admittedly rather tenous connection with golf that I wish to emphasise. His claim to be Scottish was impeccable as he was born at Carskerdo, near St. Andrews, on 14 September 1742 where his father, William Wilson, farmed. He entered St. Andrews University in 1757 when he was 15 years old and it would be a poor student indeed who did not try his hand at the local craze.

It should be remembered that the Society of St. Andrews Golfers -later to become the Royal and Ancient- had only been formed in 1754. As well as copying the rules of the Company of Gentlemen who played at Leith they promoted a competition among themselves for a silver club, as those players at Leith did. The St.Andrews club however was not obtained by gift of the Local Council but subscribed for by the members. Until 1824 the winner of the Silver Club Competition became Captain for the ensuing year. The very first winner (and therefore the first recorded Captain of the Royal and Ancient) was a Merchantin and Baillie of St. Andrews. His name was William Landale - and it is thought he was a close relation of Alison Landale - who was Wilson's mother.

More evidence of the connection between Wilson and golf is soughtin particular, did he ever show any signs of the affliction when in America?

THE SOUTH AFRICAN 3 SHILLING BOOKLET

In 1948, South Africa issued a booklet which consisted of 6 panes: two panes Scott No. 46c penny Springbok, two panes pf No. 49d the 1 penny Jan van Riebeek's Ship, two panes of No. 52d the 1½ penny stamp pictur -ing a gold mine. A total of 36 pence in stamps (3 shillings)

This booklet features various advertising on interleaves: Seeds, Sports wear, Lighter, Writing Pad, Tea, Tires, Cigarettes, Fences etc. The one of interest to us is, however, an advertising feature of a Golfer in a swing position. In addition to these private ads, there are a few Post Office ads. There is also a pane of blue airmail labels in the middle of the booklet.

I recently had the opprtunity to acquire a small accumulation of these booklets. Upon examining them, I noticed that all were different. The difference did not come from the advertising on the covers or interleaves All were the same. They all feature the "Kirchhoffs for Seed" ad on the front cover (Illustration No. 1) and the same advertisings on the interleaves.

The difference comes from the postal advertising that are to be found on the margins of the booklet panes. All six are different: four of them are bilingual while one is solely in Afrikans and another is solely in English. They are as follows:

All the booklets are fairly difficult to find, however, I do not know if any version is scarcer than the other. Also I do not know of other versions of this booklet exist.
