

LADIES' BRITISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP


The Ladies British Open Amateur Championship was first played 100 years ago in 1893. In 1931 it was played for the first and only time in the Republic of Ireland at Portmarnock. The winner was Enid Wilson who at the age of 21 defeated Wanda Morgan 7 and 6. She went on to complete a unique hat trick of British titles, then retired from competitive golf. Whether or not it was this unique visit of a British Golf event played in Ireland, a skeleton type datestamp was used on 4th & 12th June 1931.

Enid Wilson is still hale and hearty and a collector of golf stamps.

THE OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP ROYAL PORTRUSH 1951


In 1951 The Open Championship was played over Royal Portrush in Northern Ireland. This was a break in tradition, all Open Championships so far had been played over Scotland or England. Prestwick, St. Andrews, Muirfield, Carnoustie & Troon had been the Scottish venues and the 'Royals' of Cinque Ports, Liverpool, Lytham and St. Annes, St. Georges, Princes had been the English venues.


The Winner of the 1951 Championship was Max Faulkner. He was a colorful player in his dress (similar to Payne Stewart) and a very powerful hitter of the ball. His winning score was 285 over Royal Portrush Links.



The Post Office services were available on course during the Championship.

A Mobile Post Office was in operation and handled mail posted. The Mobile Post Office 2 Code A was only for Registered Mail or counter work as shown in the illustration.

THE CANADA CUP PORTMARNOCK G.C. 1960

The Canada Cup was founded in America in 1953 as an International Team event for professional golfers with the intention of spreading international goodwill.

Each country is represented by two players, the best team agregate over 72 holes are - winners of the Canada Cup. The individual winner with the best score wins the International Trophy.

The Canada Cup is now known as The World Cup.

The 8th Canada Cup was played over Portmarnock. Postal facilities were available on course and a skeleton type datestamp was used on mail posted there between 20th and 25th June 1960. No examples for the 20th June are known todate but, all other dates are illustrated below.

The United States Team represented by Sam Snead & Arnold Palmer won the Canada Cup with England runners-up. The individual winner was Flory van Donck of Belgium who won the International Trophy.











ALCAN INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP 1970



This short lived - Championship which was first played in 1967, was played for a third time at Portmarnock (no Championship in 1969). Winner was Paddy Skerritt, St. Annes, Dublin, with the score of 286.

Postal facilities were available on course and mail posted received a skeleton type datestamp between 14th and 20th Spetember 1970.

No special covers were produced but, a printed Championship scorecard made a nice souvenir as illustrated below.





EUROPEAN AMATEUR GOLF TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

Founded in 1959 by the European Golf Association for competition among member countries of the Association. The Championship is held biennially and played in rotation round the countries which are grouped in four geographical zones.

Each team consists of six players who play two qualifying rounds of 18 holes, the five best scores of each round constituting the team aggregate. Flights for match play are then arranged according to qualifying round rankings. For the match play, teams consist of five players, playing two foursomes in the morning and five singles in the afternoon.

A similar championship is held every year for junior teams.





To commemorate The European Amateur Golf Team Championship played at Killarney, two stamps were issued. The designs are based from photographs by Jack McManus. They show the 10th hole (tee and green) on the Killeen Championship Course. The hole has the most intrigueing of names - 'Pure Champagne'. The reason being that when the green was under construction, a bottle of champagne was buried in the centre of the green.

The stamps are photogravure printed at Stamping Branch, Dublin Castle, in sheets of 100 stamps, single pane on unwatermarked paper. An ususual point regarding the 6p. value was the guillotining of the top two rows before distribution to the postoffice.

Varieties occur on both values and are as follows:

6p R3/8 Line through EI of EIRE R6/3 Red spot on head 9p R2/3 Accent over E of EIRE (not constant) R1/5 White mark on G (not constant)

The most striking variety is the missing black print on the 6p. value - of which 10 copies exist (see illustration below)








Two handstamps were prepared, both used the 'Golfer' as the central motif.

I first wrote about the Carrolls Open handcancels in the December, 1988 TRE TIMP (No.6) Since that article I am now able to extend and add much more information about the hand cancels. I was led to believe that the extra days were used for 'Practice play', this is not the case. The extra days were for the Pro-Am days play, with the exception of -1980 where an extra days play was needed due to bad weather.

Since the 1980's An Post has failed to notify collectors of special postmarks other than those relating to philatelic exhibitions in which the philatelic section participates. However in most years the Bureau in Dublin obtains the canceller from the local office after the Open and then services the covers sent in advance before the event! They are very strict and will not entertain postmarking covers after the event.

Various color inks have been used during the period 1976-93. Both black and violet inks being used at the course - those applied by the Bureau in Dublin are struck in black.

There have been special cancels each year since 1976, with two for 1987, when a Pro-Am cancel was used during the 25th Anniversary of the Championship (first played in 1963). In all, 11 types of handstamps have been used (plus Pro-Am cancel) and these are illustrated below and show the dates where they have been used in following years. The Table on the following page lists each venue with all the dates known. The inks used may not be complete and it is hoped that further information will be forthcoming. I have to point out that the handstamp for 1991 is very scarce, this was due to a change in venue to Killarney and only those attending the event managed to service covers.

THE WALKER CUP and IRISH GOLF UNION



The Walker Cup, the amateur equivalent of the Ryder Cup, is the oldest national team event in world golf. It is now played every two years on a home/away basis between the amateur golfers of Britain and Ireland and the United States. This years competition will be held in Ireland for the first time and Portmarnock Golf Club is the venue from 5th/6th September.

The origins of this event lie in a series of matches played between the Royal Canadian Golf Association and the USGA immediately after the end of the First World War and the tradition of North American and European golfers competing together in the British and American Amateur Championships.


The then President of the USGA. Herbert Walker, subsequently came up with the idea of holding an international amateur team championship and donated an International Challenge Trophy later to be christened the Walker Cup. All golfing countries were invited to participate in the inaugural event in 1921 but none accepted. It was only after William Fownes led an unofficial American team to victory over Britain later that year that the R & A decided to send a team to the 1922 Walker Cup. Since no other teams entered, all future matches were fought out between Britain (and later Ireland) and the United States. Because of the cost of competing and the travelling involved the tournament was played only every two years after 1924.

The American team didn't taste defeat until 1938 and it was not until 1989 that the British and Irish team won on American soil with a team containing two Irishmen, Garth McGimpsey and Eoghan O'Connell. The record for most consecutive appearances is held by an Irishman Joe Carr with nine uninterrupted matches. Despite the American domination players from both teams have gone on to dominate both the amateur and professional games worldwide.

The Golfing Union of Ireland was formed in October 1891 and originally consisted of 12 Clubs. The Union has now progressed to a membership of 275 affiliated Clubs.

The objects of the Union are to promote, foster and administer the game of Mens' Amateur Golf in Ireland in accordance with the Rules of Golf, Rules of Amateur Status and the Rules of Handicapping. It also co-operates with all other Unions on the International Amateur Golf scene.

The administration of Amateur Golf encompasses involvement in all International events throughout the world where Ireland is represented and involvement in the European Golf Association; the running of Boys', Youths' and Senior Amateur Championships in Ireland. It also encompasses sending teams to the Home International Championship; the Quadrangular Matches; the Boys' Home Internationals; and various other International matches.



Two special post marks were produced to commemorate the issue of both stamps.

The Walker Cup cancellation was used on both 5th and 5th September.

BORD FAILTE WRITE and INVITE CAMPAIGN 1988

(Extract from 'The Revealer' Linter 1989)

In early April every Irish household in the Republic of Ireland received a pair of special prepaid postcards as part of Bord Failte's campaign to attract British tourists to the country. The fold-over cards carry brief details of fares and package deals available to British visitors. Each household was asked to send them to relatives and friends in Britain encouraging them to holiday in Ireland. The cards were delivered to each household by An Post and include the normal An Post postage paid imprint. The cards were not available at post offices only through the Bord Failte (Irish Tourist Board). The folders also incorporated an International Reply Card which prospective visitors could complete and send to Bord Failte for further information. Vertical rouletting separates each pair of folders including cards thus giving two types i.e. cards with either left or right vertical side rouletted. However the folders are best collected as a complete pair given that the top section has the tear off instructions spread across the two folders. There are several different printings as set out as below:

- 1. The initial print run had anincorrect spelling. To encourage replies several prizes were on offer including an Alfa Romeo car. However the name of the car was incorrectly included as "Alpha Romeo". All such folders were overprinted by obliterating the incorrect section in silver and reprinting in black over the silver. No cards are known to have survived without the overprinting.
- 2. The second print run had the correct spelling.
- 3. A special single folder type was distributed to travel agents in Britain. Text layout differed but the folder included both the postage paid card and the international reply card. The postage paid card had straight edges on all four sides and a preprinted message included on the reverse side. As the cards were not posted from Ireland, the postage paid imprint was unnecessary. The folders were held in place by a re-sealable tab and the legend "Use This Re-Sealable Tab" was printed twice beneath the reply card.
- 4. A variation of the above type 3 has also been noted. The type 4 is the same as type 3 but does not have the re-sealable tab or the legend referred to.

Note: some 85,000 card were returned but, these have all now been destroyed.



CORK STAMP EXHIBITION

1991

The Cork Philatelic Society Exhibition has been held Annually since 1968. The first two years were in partnership with the Numismatic Society. A souvenir cover and special postmark has been rpoduced each year since the first Exhibition. In 1977 the first book —let appeared — 50 printed and stitched together by a member of the Society. In 1991 the Society used a 'Golf' theme for both cover and booklet, these are illustrated below.

Altogether 301 covers were sold and out of a print run of 350 booklets, 336 were sold and 14 destroyed. Both these items are now quite elusive due to the low numbers produced.
