Personalized Stamps or P-Stamps by Cora Collins

In this issue and the last you will find information on personalized stamps (P-stamps) of New Zealand and Austria as well as the following on Japanese P-stamps. The concept has taken off in as many directions as possible from those in New Zealand being issued by private companies, Austria postal administration prints the stamps but does not sell them and Japan both prints the stamps and sells them through the postal system. There seems to be little control and they will not be catalogued as government issues. It would seem that individuals could just print their own stamps in some countries and no one would be the wiser. As a former auditor, I wonder what systems the governmental agencies have in place to catch fraud in the use of stamps to ensure the government gets paid for its deliverance of the mail.

The information on Japan's use of personalized stamps was provided by Ron Casey, editor of Japanese Philately. P-Stamps were first introduced in Japan at PHILANIPPON '01 in the form of non-postal tabs attached to selected stamp issues, and the evolution in various phases until a change in 2006 which allowed personalized photos to be part of the actual design rather than an attached non-postal tab. Australia had similar sheets of stamps with the tabs available at OLYMPHILEX 2000. One could even send a photograph to the postal administration and have it applied to the tab for a fee. Most of these sheets were probably done as souvenirs of the events and very few went through the mail.

In Japan corporate use of the service greatly expanded when the facility to produce stamps with personalized photos as part of the actual design was introduced in 2006. There is no doubt that this now forms by far the majority of the revenue which Japan Post receives from offering this service, far beyond its usage by individuals ordering one or two sheets as a novelty. Japan Post, seemingly always seeking to produce innovative products, is now offering an option with a P-stamp sheet housed in a decorative folder. The folders also include additional promotional products. In the majority of cases these are picture postcards with personalized photos, but we have also noted examples with an accompanying CD, and in one instance, an encased golf ball!

Unfortunately, since privatization and the subsequent desire to maximize revenue at every opportunity, Japan Post has caused some confusion by selling copies of large promotional printings of P-stamps through their post offices—effectively becoming selling agents for organizations' own stamps which Japan Post produced for them as a customized service. This has led to examples of such sheets produced for high-profile individuals or organizations being reported in the popular press as having been issued by and available from Japan Post. Not only is Japan Post selling P-stamp sheets and folders at post offices, but they are also distributing glossy brochures of upcoming issues with enclosed order forms. The website describes both sheets and folders as "post office related goods". Despite this overt marketing by Japan Post, individuals buying them should not confuse them with official stamp issues produced by Japan Post.

The P-stamps on the website are sold at varying prices. We do not know what the purchaser is charged for Japan Post to produce these products, but one should assume that the cost varies depending upon the amount of formatting needed, the denominations 50 yen or 80 yen, domestic postcard and domestic letter rate. There are many unknowns in this process.

Yutaka Matsubayashi has provided us with three examples of sheets of P-stamps. Two of the sheets depict well known young golfers, Ai Miyazato and Ryo Ishikawa. The third commemorated the Niigata National Athletic Fair in 2009.

Whether or not you want to collect the P-stamps is of course a personal choice. You will have many nice pictures, however you may never know their value since they will not appear in any catalogue. It also means you will be at the mercy of the dealers or sellers. It may add a lot of material without adding any value. I think eventually it will ruin topical collecting since judges will have no bases for knowledge of these stamps either.

The stamp features Pacific Games mascot Joemy showing off the flags of all 22 island countries taking part in NC2011 event. Niue, Samoa, American Samoa, Federated States of Micronesia, Nauru, Fiji, Marshall Islands, Tuvalu, Tonga, Solomon Islands, Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, Palau, Norfolk, Kiribati, Cook Islands, Vanuatu, Tokelau, Papua New Guinea, French Polynesia, Wallis and Fortuna, and New Caledonia. Some of the sports depicted in the margin of the sheet include golf, soccer, weightlifting, powerlifting, judo, karate, swimming, sailing, rugby.
